CONTROVERSIAL ELDER QUALIFICATIONS

1. What does it mean to be a husband of one wife?

2. Must an elder have more than one child to have "believing children"?





POSSIBLE INTERPRETATIONS:

- An elder must be married
- An elder cannot be married to more than one wife at a time
- An elder cannot be one who is divorced
- An elder's spouse cannot be one who is a divorcee
- An elder cannot remarry while his wife is alive
- An elder cannot remarry even in the event of the death of his spouse
- An elder must be of a character such that he is a one-woman kind of man

- IT REALLY MUST MEAN ONE OF TWO THINGS:
- 1. Does it refer to **the state of his life**? (He is only allowed one wife in his whole life)
- 2. Does it refer to **his attitude**? (He is a man known for faithfulness to his wife)

There is no way of knowing which it is without looking at other passages.



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one woman man

The bishop therefore must be without reproach, the **husband of one wife**, (1 Tim 3:2)

He must be a one-woman man


Let none be enrolled as a widow under threescore years old, having been **the wife of one man** (1 Tim 5:9)

She must have been a one-man woman

BUT WAIT!!!

"I desire therefore that the younger widows marry, bear children, rule the household, give no occasion to the adversary for reviling:" (1 Tim 5:14)

Paul says that the best thing a widow can do is to marry a second man if she is widowed.



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THIS IS A QUALIFICATION OF **CHARACTER**.

A man can have been married multiple times and still meet this qualification.

A man can even be widowed and still meet this qualification.

A man who is widowed is going to struggle to meet the qualifications found in 1 Tim 3:11 though!

"Their wives likewise must be dignified, not slanderers, but sober-minded, faithful in all things." (1 Tim 3:11)



<u>The elder must be the father of faithful children</u> (I Tim. 3:4, Tit. 1:6)

Everyone agrees that it is better if an elder has multiple faithful children... but that isn't the issue.

Does The Scripture <u>REQUIRE</u> a man to have multiple children to become an elder?

The word 'children' can be used in <u>two</u> ways;

To refer to a plurality of children
Or what is referred to as "plural

Examples Of A Class Plural:

Gen. 21:7 "And she said, Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah wou

Eph. 6:1 "Children, obey your parents"

Matt. 22:24 "If a man die, having no children, his brother shall marry his wife" 1 Tim. 5:4 "But if a widow has children or grandchildren..." To say that "children" has to mean "more than one," then Paul is also telling Titus that a man is disqualified only if he has <u>more than one</u> child who is accused of dissipation or rebellion.
